Dear Senators Barrasso, Gardner and Sinema:

On behalf of the Partnership for Employer-Sponsored Coverage, we write with our strong support for the *Jobs and Premium Protection Act, S. 80*, to repeal the health insurance tax (HIT) under Affordable Care Act (ACA). We appreciate your leadership on this important reform effort which impacts the over 181 million Americans covered through employment-based benefits plans.

The Partnership for Employer-Sponsored Coverage is committed to ensuring that employer-sponsored coverage is strengthened and remains a viable, affordable option for decades to come. Employer-sponsored coverage has been the backbone of our nation's health system for nearly eight decades. Employers have a vested interest in health care quality, value, and system viability.

For small and mid-size employers who disproportionally rely on coverage through the fully-insured market, in which an employer purchases a pre-designed plan from an insurance carrier, the HIT strikes a direct blow to their plan premiums. The HIT is a direct tax on fully-insured carriers which is passed along to the customer – small and mid-size businesses and the millions of hardworking Americans and their families that are enrolled in this type of employment-based coverage. The inclusion of the HIT was as an offset for other provisions of the ACA. The consequences of this tax levied on the fully-insured market mean higher premiums on employees and employers.

Thank you again for introducing S. 80. We look forward to continuing to work with you and your colleagues in a bipartisan manner to fully repeal the HIT.
